#### **Tightrope Act**

Lutherans are tightrope artists, at least when we're doing it right.

What do I mean by that? Lutherans try to walk a line between two extremes. We walk that line both in our thinking and in how we feel about ourselves and God. Psychological. Theological. We are on a tightrope.

Psychologically, we try to maintain two different things which are both true but seem mutually exclusive. Sin is evil, we have sin, we are evil, God hates sin. That is the Law. Jesus has suffered and died for our sins, He has taken away the punishment, so God loves us. That is the Gospel. Both of these things are true at the same time. God doesn't want us to sit around moping, or to hate ourselves, or to punish ourselves. At the same time, God doesn't want us to think that because we're forgiven, that we're awesome and perfect and can't ever do anything wrong. So we try to see ourselves as God sees us: Forgiven sinners. That's a hard tightrope to walk. We naturally want to see ourselves as better than we actually are, and sometimes we see our sins as worse than we actually are. Both of these tendencies distort how God wants us to see ourselves. Not hopeless, not perfect. Just sinners who have been forgiven.

Theologically, we walk a line between Roman Catholicism and the rest of the Protestants. Roman Catholicism tells people that they must follow rules in order to make God happy with them. They threaten that purgatory is the fate of those who do not live virtuous enough lives here on Earth. Protestants (Reformed, Methodists, Presbyterian, UCC, any community church) ultimately end up telling people the same. They believe in Jesus, but they don't believe in the value of forgiveness over the long term. To a Protestant, you have to *prove* that you are Christian through your good works. Lutherans believe that Christ and His good works prove that we are Christian, that it is Jesus who makes God happy with us once and for all. Our job is to stay connected to that, to stay plugged into it. We do this by hearing about it, talking about it, and singing about it. We do this by praying for forgiveness, by offering forgiveness to our neighbor, and then trying again.

Walk the line. You are neither the hero nor the villain of this story. Jesus is the hero, and He tells you that He's saved you. The devil is the villain, and he tells you that God doesn't love you, that you're awful. Or he tells you that you're just fine the way you are and don't need to be saved. Neither is the truth. You do need to be saved. Thanks be to God, you are saved. That is what you are. Saved. A saved sinner who still sins but is still saved. Don't sweat when you fall. God will pick you up.

#### **Elder's Corner**



Independence Day is approaching. July 4<sup>th</sup> is on a Tuesday this year, so we might not all get the 3-day (or more) weekend we hoped for. It marks the adoption of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776 when the United States declared independence from Great Britain. Graduation ceremonies were conducted just weeks ago. These graduates gained independence from high school or college and will move into the next phase of their lives. Most will no longer be dependent on their parents and this will create a new lifestyle. It's so very important for them to become properly independent to create a successful future for themselves and others. At our local Memorial Service a few weeks ago, the guest speakers talked about the great sacrifices our veterans made and how we trusted and depended on them to be able to keep our nation free so we can live our lives without fear of unjust government. The keynote speaker leaned heavily on the religious side, which was impressive! He talked about God and how we are a great nation because it was founded on religious principles. There are people who are trying to erase parts of our history because there were negative things that happened. We must keep history as it happened, because that is "history". We have been blessed to learn from our past. He stated this about the Pledge of Allegiance of the United States, "It doesn't need to be rewritten, it needs to be reread." It was written by Francis Bellamy in 1892 and changed only three times, the latest change in 1954 by President Eisenhower, who added the phrase "one Nation under God." I looked up exactly what that true meaning is; under God means "God willing / having faith in God." Notice this is God with a capital G!

Too many people give up on God and drift away from their spiritual upbringing and don't think God cares about their lives. Matthew 28:20 gives us God's promise, "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Dependence on the Lord is our lifeline to eternity. We all have our "independent" viewpoints, but the Lord gives us proper guidance in the scriptures. 1 Corinthians 11:11-12 tells us, "Nevertheless, in the Lord woman is not independent of man nor man of woman; for as woman was made from man, so man is now born of woman. And all things are from God." We are also to be dependent on each other for support, comfort, and scriptural learning. Our parents raise us to be independent, but they never stop being our parents. My parents are both in heaven now, but they never stopped offering advice or encouragement, right up to their last days. I miss them dearly, but they always were there for me, no matter the circumstances. Proverbs 22:6 reads, "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not turn from it." We may not always completely agree with them, but we are commanded to respect them. Exodus 20:12 is where we find the fifth commandment, "Honor thy father and thy mother." Independence Day has much greater importance than just another paid holiday off.

We pray dear Lord, that you would help us to find strength by depending on you for all things. Give us the wisdom to seek your help in good times and also in difficult times.

We pray this in your holy name, Amen.




#### **July Prayer Calendar**
